UCLA Psychiatry Residency Training Program Clinician-Educator Concentration and Interest Group

What is the Clinician-Educator Concentration?	The Clinician-Educator Concentration is a 1-year program that aims to provide interested residents with formal training in medical education through a structured curriculum on educational principles and the opportunity to work on an educational innovation .
What are the requirements for being in the concentration?	Residents accepted into the concentration must meet all the following requirements by the end of residency: 1. Attendance at the "summer series" foundational coursework at the beginning of the academic year. 2. Completion of a skills logbook to apply the knowledge that you have learned in the foundational coursework. 3. Participation in monthly concentration meetings for one afternoon per month. 4. Completion of an educational innovation that meets an identified need on a departmental and/or national level. Potential projects include developing a new curriculum, improving an existing didactic series, creation of an online lecture series, or publication of a book or other educational aid. Projects should be guided by evidence-based educational techniques wherever possible (e.g., use of active learning over passive learning) and should be designed in such a way that their impact on leaners can be measured objectively. 5. A capstone Grand Rounds presentation on a topic of the resident's choosing that is presented in a way that uses and highlights best practices in educational techniques. 6. Meeting with a faculty mentor on at least a quarterly basis. 7. Regular participation in the Curriculum Committee. 8. Regular participation in various educational activities (e.g., teaching in the core curriculum, leading medical student clerkship didactics, assisting in problem-based learning, etc.).
What topics are covered during the concentration didactics? Who can apply for the concentration?	Any PGY-2 or 3 resident is welcome to apply for the concentration to begin their participation as a PGY-3 or 4.
How long is the concentration?	The concentration lasts 1 year. If interested, residents who have completed the concentration as a PGY-3 can consider doing one or more of the following as a PGY-4: Serving as Education Chief Continuing their educational innovation project Participating in the UCLA Medical Education Fellowship
How do I apply to the concentration?	Residents interested in applying to the concentration must both identify a faculty mentor and complete an educational innovation project proposal by the end of January. This proposal effectively serves as the application for the concentration. Residents who are accepted into the concentration are usually given between 2 and 8 hours a week to focus on their scholarly project.
What do I get for participating?	In addition to gaining competence in their teaching abilities, residents who meet all concentration requirements will be given a plaque certifying completion of the concentration upon graduation. The concentration aims to improve the ability of graduating residents to obtain junior faculty positions or other roles where they can stay engaged in teaching and education.
What if I am interested in education but am not yet able to join the concentration?	Residents at all levels of training who are interested in education are encouraged to join the Clinician-Educator Interest Group . Members of the interest group will have access to most aspects of the concentration, including networking events, a faculty mentor, and the opportunity to participate in various teaching activities.
